Apollo was worshipped both as the patron of the colonists at Tarentum, and as the patron of the Pythagorean religious order there, which saw a resurgence of influence in the Fourth Century BC largely thanks to Archytas. The reverse motif of Herakles fighting the Nemean lion was used on contemporary silver Diobols of the Tarentum and its colony Herakleia; although on the silver issues it is presented in the 'tondo' scene where a crouched Herakles wrestles the lion by placing it in a stranglehold.

Soon after being acclaimed king, Antiochos the Third appointed the Seleukid nobleman Molon as satrap of Media and Molon's brother Alexander as satrap of Persia. After Antiochos left Babylonia on his way to receive his crown in Antioch, the brothers rebelled, reputedly because of their great hatred of the king's chief minister Hermeias.

Unchecked by the first two generals Antiochos sent against him, Molon, at the head of a large army, found himself master of the lands to the east of the Tigris. His initial attempts to pass the river, though, were foiled by the Seleukid general in Mesopotamia, Zeuxis. But later when the Achaean-born general Xenoetas, who had been dispatched with a large army by Hermeias, tried to cross the river, Molon's forces crushed the Seleukid army. In 221 BC, Molon crossed the Tigris and entered Seleukeia, making himself master of the city and the whole of Babylon and Mesopotamia.

The magnitude of the insurrection forced Antiochos, who had been campaigning against the Ptolemies, to march in person against the rebels. After wintering in Nisibis, Antiochos crossed the Tigris in 220 BC and advanced south to confront Molon. He defeated the rebels near Apollonia (Sitt Ake in Assyria). The rebel brothers survived the battle; but committed suicide to avoid capture. At the behest of Hermeias, Molon's body was impaled on the slopes of the Zagros Mountains.

Historically and symbolically important, this type Half Gerah is one of the earliest Jewish coins and ultimately served as the model for the modern Israeli shekel. The lily depicted on the obverse is the ancient symbol of purity and rebirth and of the city of Jerusalem. In Hebrew, lily is shoshan, which forms the basis for the Hebrew word for six, hence linking the six-petalled lily to the six-pointed Star of David. It would next appear on the Hasmonean coins of John Hyrkanos I and Alexander Jannaios.

The showbread table and the seven-branched menorah depicted here were two of the most sacred objects in the Second Temple of Jerusalem. At the time this coin was struck, both were specific emblems of the Temple. It was only after the Temple was destroyed by Titus in AD 70, that the use of the menorah (even seen carried in triumphal procession on the Arch of Titus in Rome) as a symbol grew. Within a few hundred years, it would become a symbol of Judaism itself.

As these very rare Prutah were poorly struck and always from dies much larger than the planchets, invariably parts of the legend are off the flan.

By the final year of the Jewish War (April 69-March 70 AD), the Roman forces under Titus had gained the upper hand and the Jewish rebels were in a desperate state. Supplies in Jerusalem were near dried up, while the rebel leaders, vying for power, propelled the rebellion into violent rifts and bloody internecine strife. The introduction of large bronze denominations in this time reflects its turmoil. Silver was very difficult to obtain in the Holy City --silver denominations from this disastrous year, not surprisingly, are very rare. Josephus even depicts for us a scene of inhabitants so desperate that they took to swallowing their silver and gold. The silver shortage also caused a huge drop in the number of Shekels and their fractions available for the temple tax.

Numismatically, the result of all this was what has been called the world's first 'siege coins'. With legends denoting them as 'half' and 'quarter' (along with a smaller coin without an inscribed value, but likely one eighth Shekel), these large bronze issues served as fiduciary tokens, filling in the gaps in the rebel currency system as the disastrous end of the war loomed near.

The Sixth Roman Legion, the Iron Legion, was likely one of Mark Antony's original legions at the Battle of Philippi in 42 BC. Identified by their mintmarks IEPOCOS (Jerusalem) and IK NIKA ('Christ Conquers'), the remarkable Byzantine Jerusalem Folles, because of their date and imperial portrait, have traditionally been attributed as siege issues, struck in AD 614 when the Sasanian army under general, Shahrbaraz sacked Jerusalem and carried off the relic of the True Cross and the Patriarch Zacharias, along with a good portion of the population as captives. But a close analysis shows this attribution as highly unlikely.

The concept of siege coinage was fairly non-existent in the Classical world; while even if the concept existed then, the siege of Jerusalem only lasted 20 days, thus the time factor would likely exclude any issuance of emergency coinage. The traditional dating of this Follis was also pinned on the view that the imperial portrait depicted is that of the type used in the first four years of Heraclius' reign. However, the portrait is not that of Heraclius, but rather a generic Imperial depiction which was adapted from the Antioch mint portraits of Maurice Tiberias. In Seventh Century Syria-Palestine, the most prevalent Byzantine coin would have been from the Antioch mint, and so the mint's generic portrait would be the logical one used in the Jerusalem issue.

In recent years, scholars have argued that a more likely attribution for this Follis is a commemoration of the return of the True Cross, which ties in well with the other Jerusalem mintmark, IC NIKA – 'Christ Conquers' and with the usage of a generic Imperial portrait. The recovery of the relic by Heraclius and his decisive victory over the Sasanians at the Battle of Nineveh in December of AD 627 was a monumental event in the Christian world. Heraclius himself led the procession in Jerusalem which returned the True Cross to the Holy Sepulchre, an event which most likely occurred in the early spring of AD 630 or 631 -- dating which conforms to the fourth indictional year of Heraclius

Daughter of Ptolemy I Soter and Berenike I, Arsinoë II was married to Lysimachos when she was 15 and he 60. After his death at the Battle of Koroupedion, she married her younger brother, Ptolemy II, bringing with her the skill and experience she had gained at the Thracian court. Now styled Arsinoë Philadelphos, she co-ruled Egypt and her domains, taking on an influential role unprecedented for the dynasty at the time and becoming a model for future Ptolemaic queens. After her death, her devoted husband deified her. She was buried and deified at Mendes, where she had been a priest.

Across the breadth of Egypt, all temples were required to have a cult statue of her alongside the sanctuary's main deity. And separate sanctuaries and temples dedicated to Arsinoë Philadelphos were built throughout Egypt, in Cyprus, Thira (Santorini), Delos and elsewhere, while a portion of the orchard and vineyard tax in each Egyptian nome was marked to fund the local Arsinoë cult. She, indeed, grew to be a much loved and popular goddess.

To memorialize her, Ptolemy II also had a series of large value gold and silver coins struck in her name and image. The gold issues came to an end after the accession of Ptolemy III, but later rulers sporadically issued them well into the middle of the Second Century BC.

With the Pompeian defeat in August, 48 BC at Pharsalus, Metellus Scipio fled to Africa, where he formed an alliance with the Numidian king Juba. While with Cato the Younger's support, Scipio wrested the chief command of the Pompeian forces from Publius Attius Varus, the Roman governor of Africa. On April 6, 46 BC, Metellus Scipio led the Pompeian forces 'without skill of success' against Caesar at the battle of Thapsus (in modern day Tunisia). After the Pompeian defeat, Scipio escaped, gathering a small fleet, and attempted to sail to Roman Hispania. Bad weather forced his return to the African coast. Losing a naval engagement there, Metellus Scipio committed suicide, stabbing himself with his sword, famously saying to his men 'Imperator se bene habet' ('All is well with your commander').

After being defeated in his attack on Mauretania at the Battle of Ascurum, Pompey the Great's son Gnaeus fled to the Balearic Islands, where he was joined by his brother Sextus. They crossed into Hispania, along with Titus Labienus, and there raised another army. Caesar followed them into Hispania, and their armies met at the Battle of Munda, March 17, 45 BC. The battle was closely fought, but Caesar prevailed when his cavalry charge turned the course of the engagement. Titus Labienus and some 30,000 Pompeian soldiers died, but Gnaeus and Sextus escaped. Gnaeus was soon cornered and killed; his brother Sextus survived for another decade, forming a semi-independent kingdom in Sicily, but was eventually defeated by Agrippa and, after escaping to Asia Minor, captured and executed in Miletus.

In the past, the youth depicted on this coin was often attributed to Caius Caesar, son of Agrippa and Julia the Elder, but R. Prideaux argues that it can only be that of Augustus as the oak wreath was his personal signature. It had also been standardly dated to 17 BC and assigned to the Ludi Saeculares, but although they were religious in nature, they were not funereal, as the symbolism on this coin indicates.

The major event after 17 BC that can be tied to this coin, notes Prideaux is the sudden death in 12 BC of Augustus' chosen heir, Agrippa in Pannonia. This was a very hard loss for Rome and especially for its legions. Prideaux proposes that this issue was struck in Pannonia to pay the now leaderless Pannonian legions expediently – without having to wait for a delivery from the distant Lugdunum mint. A local celator unfamiliar with Augustus' portrait produced the dies, which would explain the very youthful head. And thematically, the coin reminds the soldiers of Augustus' corona civica, while honoring their beloved general.

In the Third Century BC, Ptolemy I Soter ordered the mass popularization of the Graeco-Egyptian god Serapis, as a means to unify his Greek and Egyptian subjects. Serapis would become Egypt's patron deity during the Ptolemaic era, while his cult would spread across most of the known Greek world, then across the Roman Empire.

In Rome, Serapis was worshipped at the Iseum Campense, the sanctuary of Isis built during the Second Triumvirate in the Campus Martius. Serapis would them burgeon in popularity under the Flavians. While in Alexandria in AD 70, Vespasian reputedly cured a blind man and a man with a limp hand through the agency of Serapis. The story of the miraculous healing spread like wildfire.

When Caracalla began his reign 128 years later, he gave his imperial support for Serapis, building a lavish Serapeum on Quirinal Hill, as a temple to Serapis, on the site of what was likely once the Temple of Bacchus and Hercules.

The Ostrogoths under Theodoric gained control of the Provence region in 508 after intervening in the Frankish-Visigothic conflict. But after the Byzantine general Belisarius landed in Italy in 536 to pursue Justinian's plan to reconquer the Italian peninsula, the hard-pressed Ostrogothic King Vitiges offered Provence to the Merovingians to avoid a war on two fronts. Thus the Franks gained permanent access to the Mediterranean. This coin was struck soon after in Marseille, possibly at the Abbey of Saint Victor, where fourteen of Depeyror's recorded seventeen pieces have shown up in excavations.
